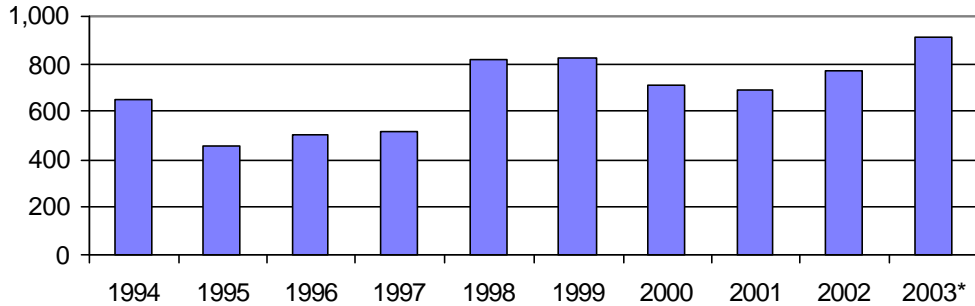

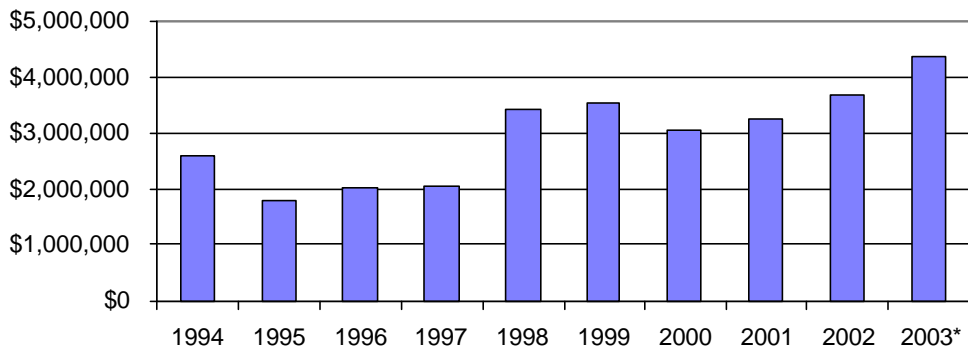

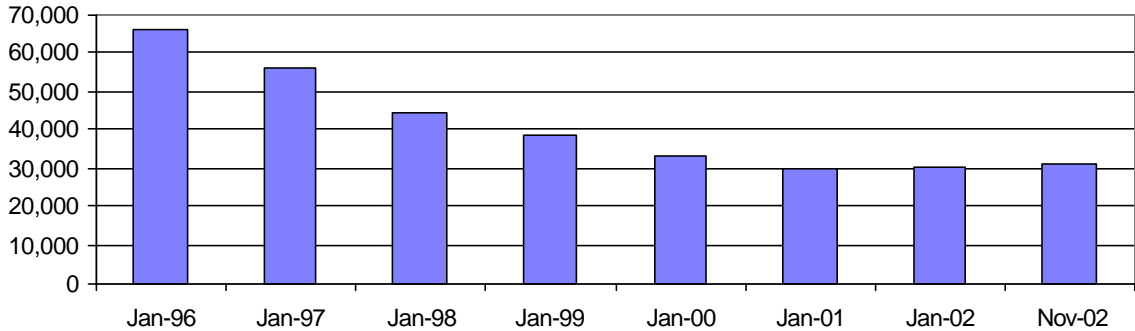

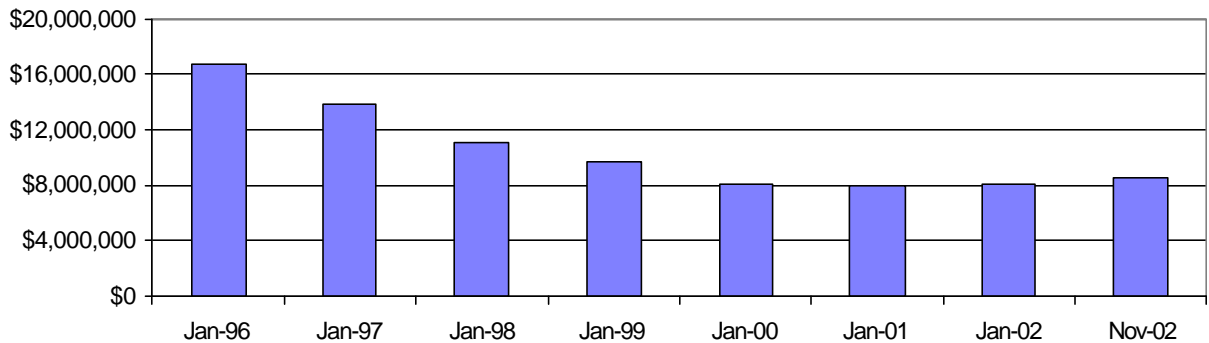

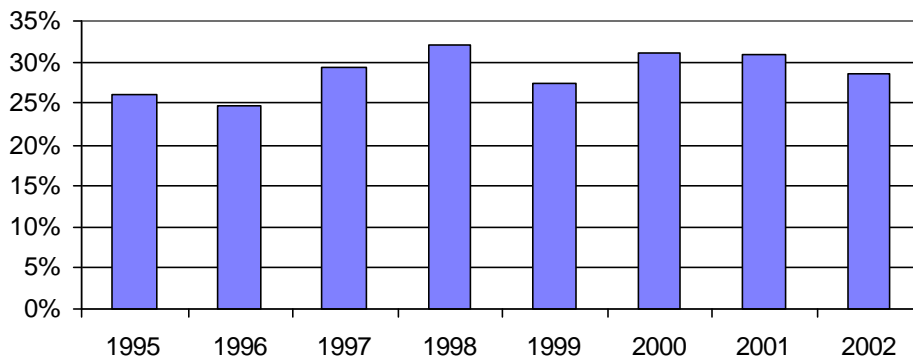

**Percent of Cases without Parent Counted on the Grant**



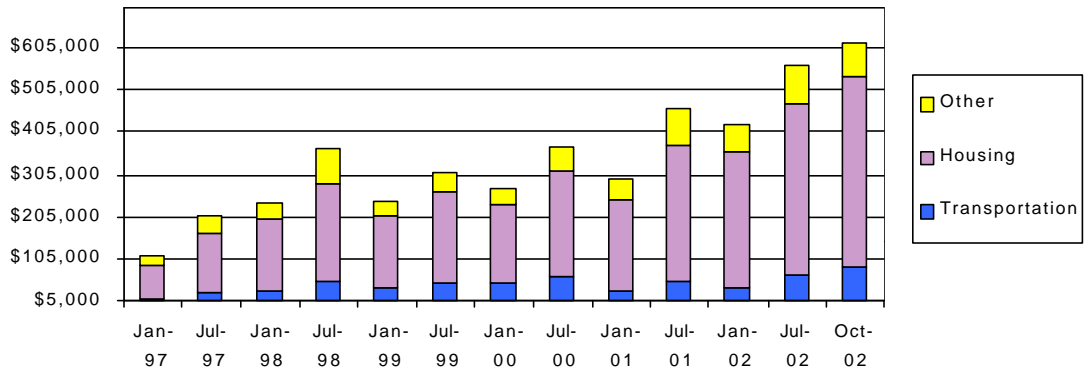

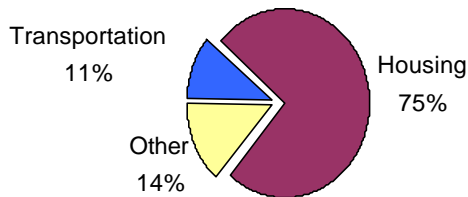

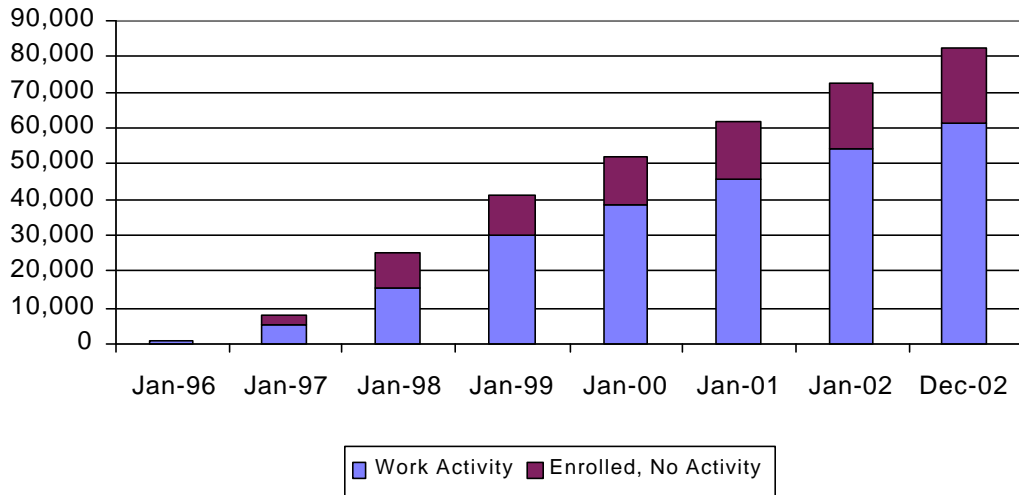

**VIEW Work Activity by Total Enrolled**



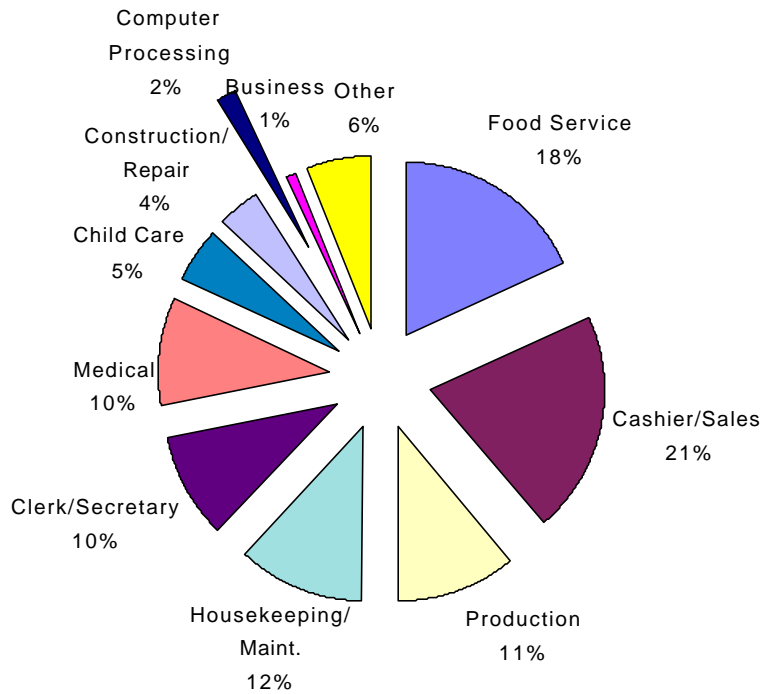

**Job Types of VIEW Participants in First Seven Years**

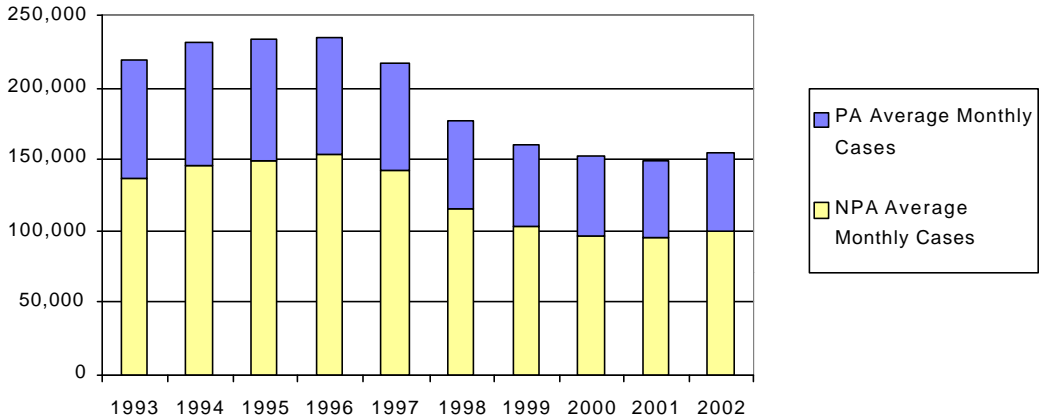

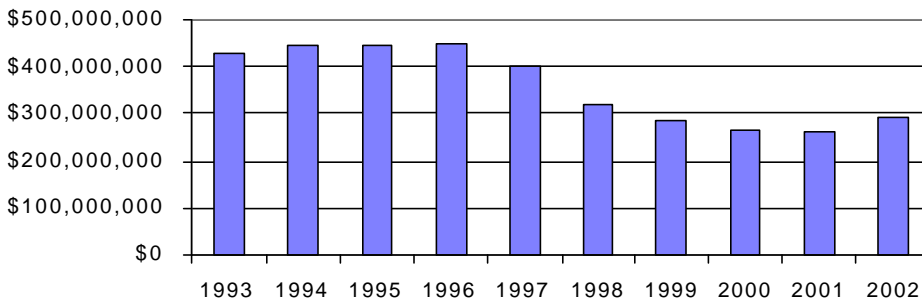

### Average Monthly Cases Under Care

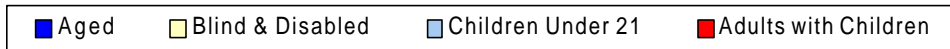
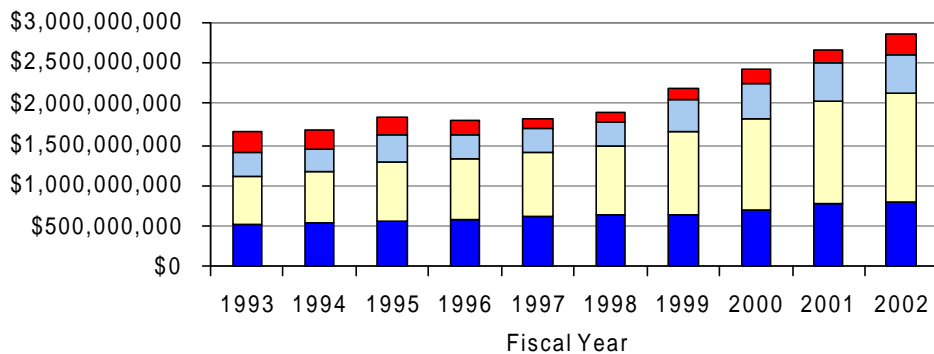

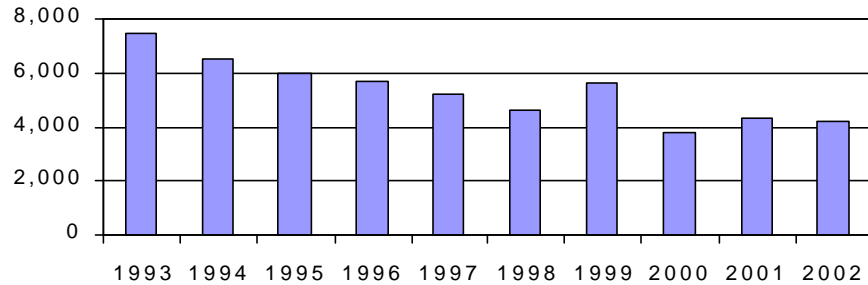

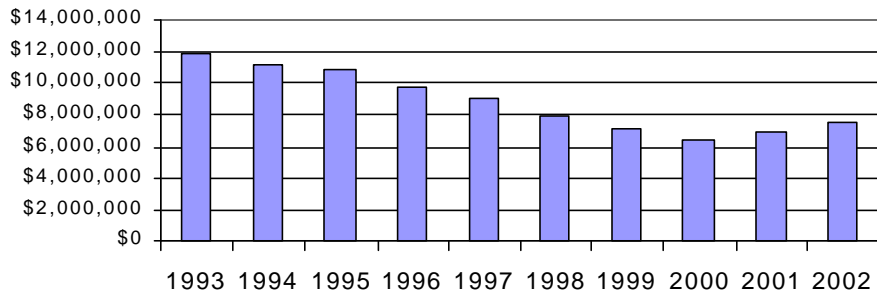

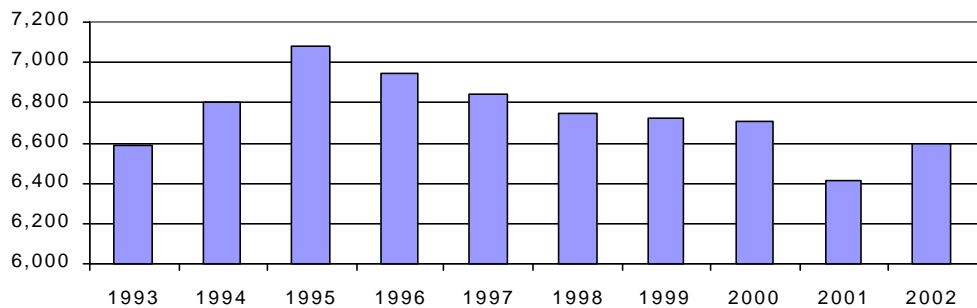

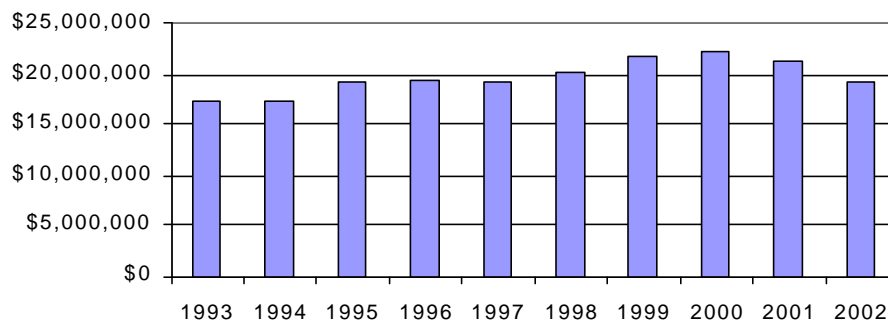

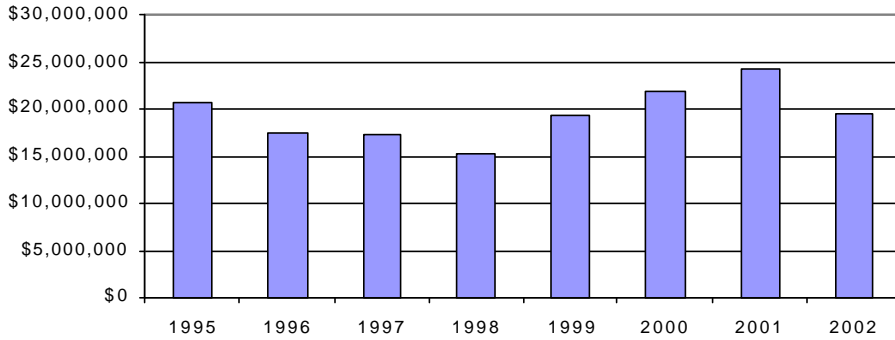

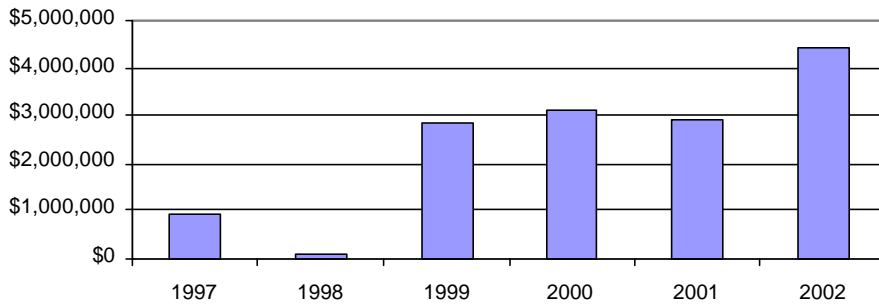

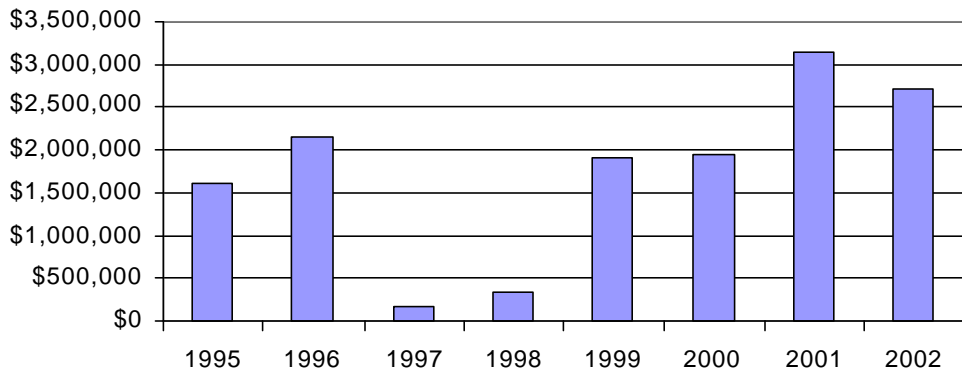

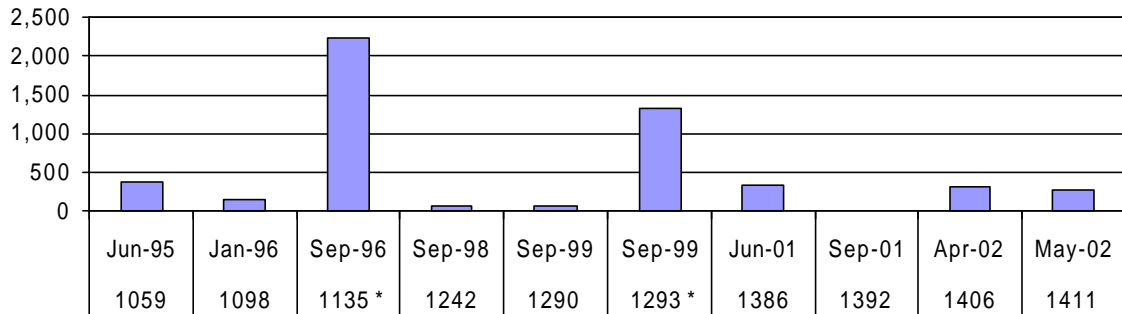

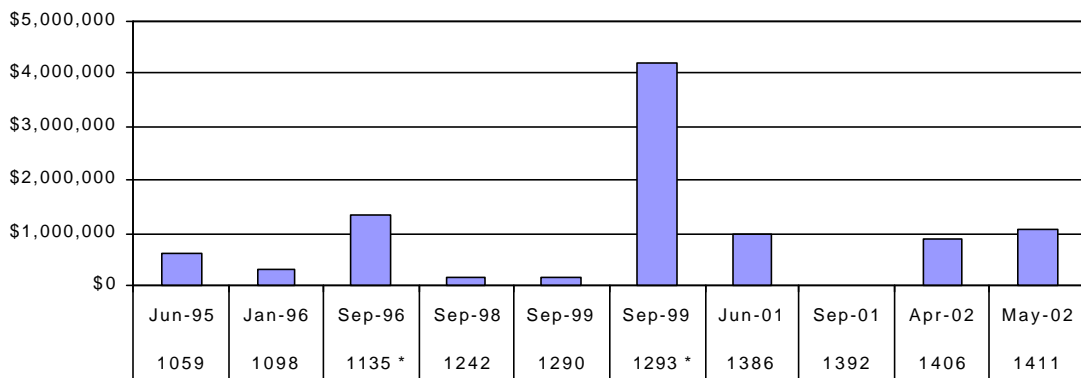

### Children in Foster Care



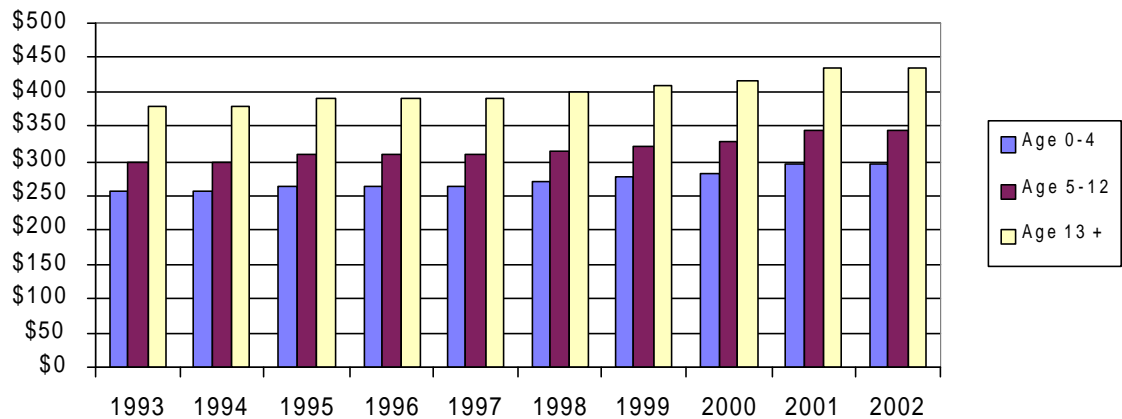

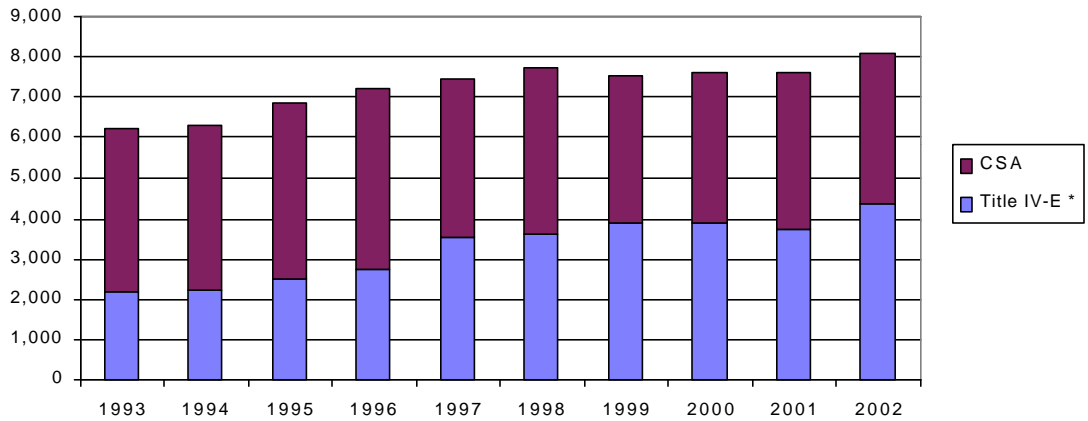

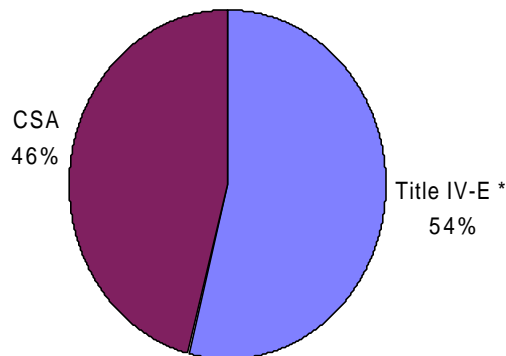

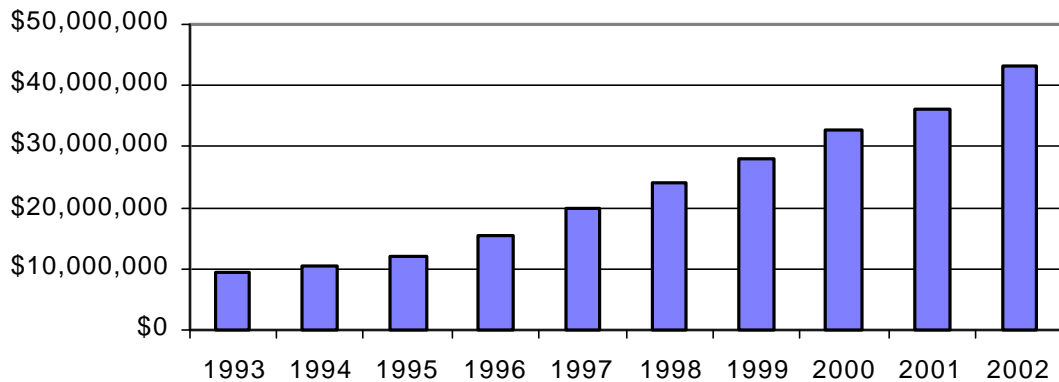
### Estimated Foster Care Maintenance Funding Fiscal Year 2002

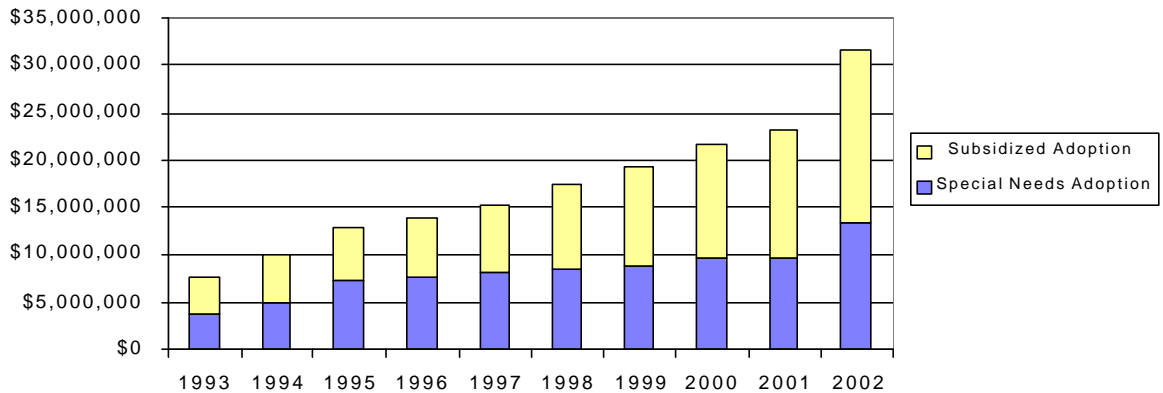

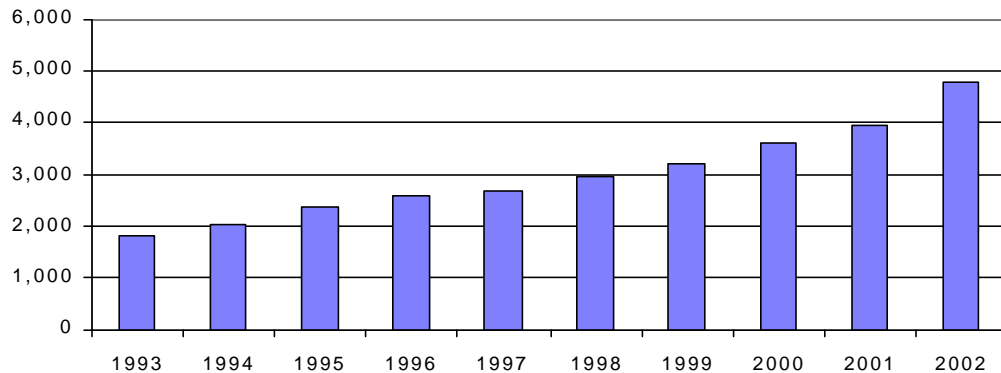

Average Number of Children Receiving Subsidy



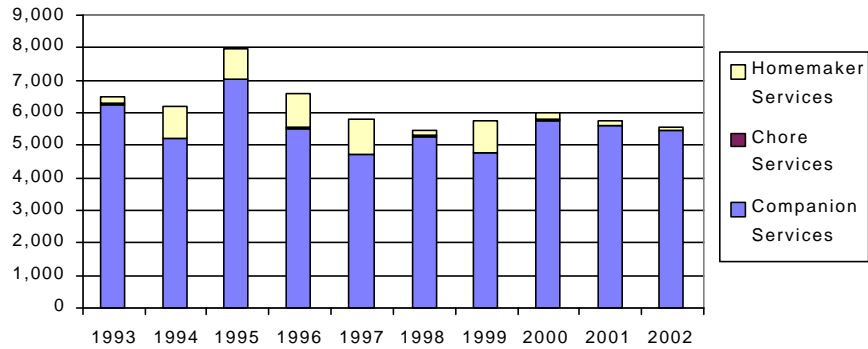

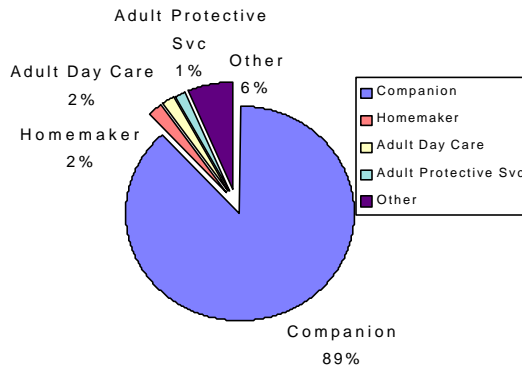

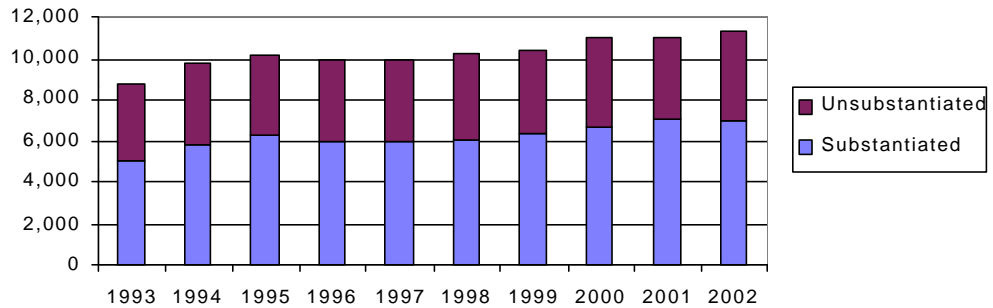

## Promoting Safe and Stable Families Program

**Date of Inception** 1993, revised 1997, reauthorized and revised 2002

**State/Federal Governing Legislation** Adoption and Safe Families Act of 1997 (Public Law 105-89), Promoting Safe and Stable Families (Public Law 107-33)

**Program Description** The Promoting Safe and Stable Families Program provides funds to communities throughout the Commonwealth to preserve and support families, to reunify children in foster care with their families, and to increase adoptions and promote adoption awareness.

**Funding Source** 75% federal Title IV-B, subpart 2 funds, 15% state funds, and 10% local funds.

**Targeted Population** Families and their children who are at risk of child abuse/neglect, out-of-home placement, or other adverse circumstances.

**Major Program Services** Parenting skills, intensive in-home counseling, child protection, school-based support services, practical skills training, socialization/recreation services, testing and evaluation services.

**Partner Organizations** The community assessment and planning process, the service selection, and the funding for each locality are under the active supervision of the Community Policy and Management Team which represents in each community the local social services, education, health, juvenile justice, and mental health/mental retardation & substance abuse agencies. In addition, parents/consumers of services, advocates, private service providers, the faith community, and law enforcement are usually represented.

**Numbers Served Annually** In fiscal year 2002, there were more than 98,539 children and families served.

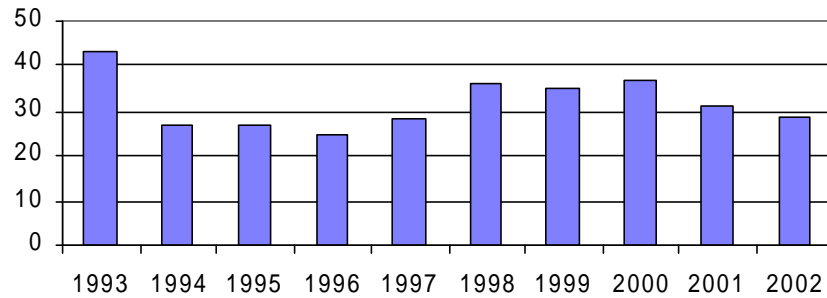

### Child Deaths from Abuse and Neglect

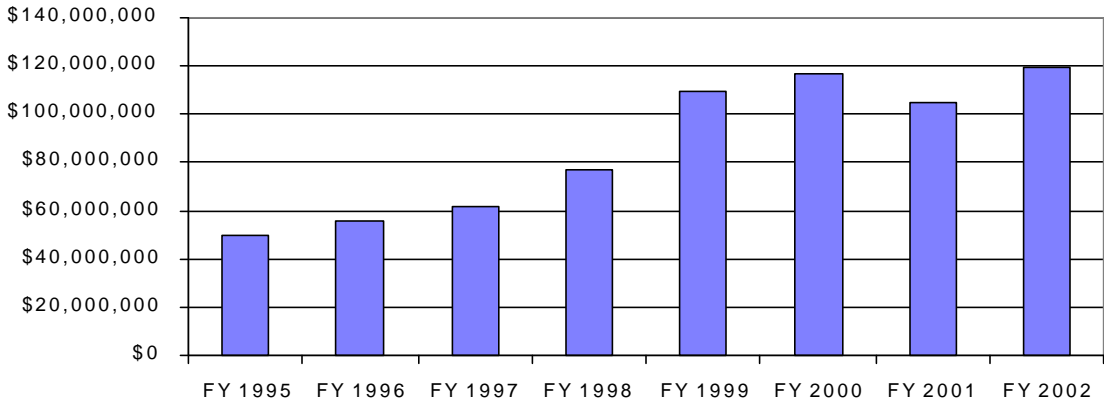

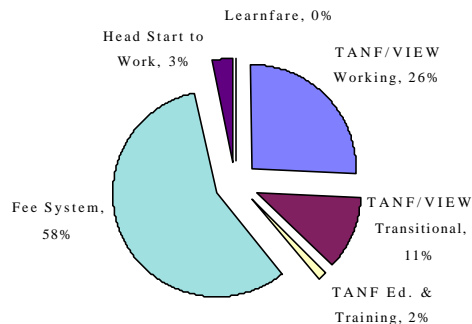

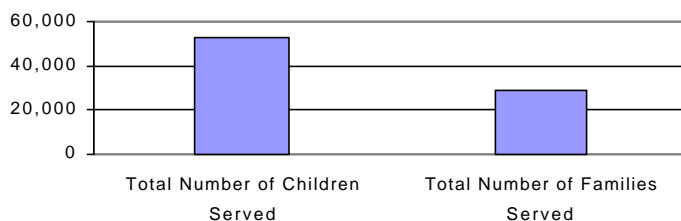

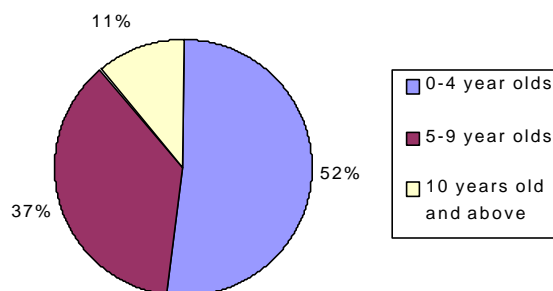

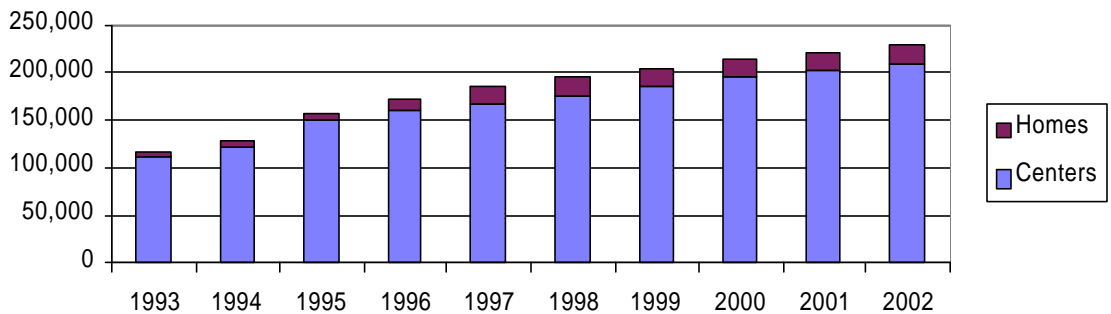

Capacity of Licensed Child Care Providers

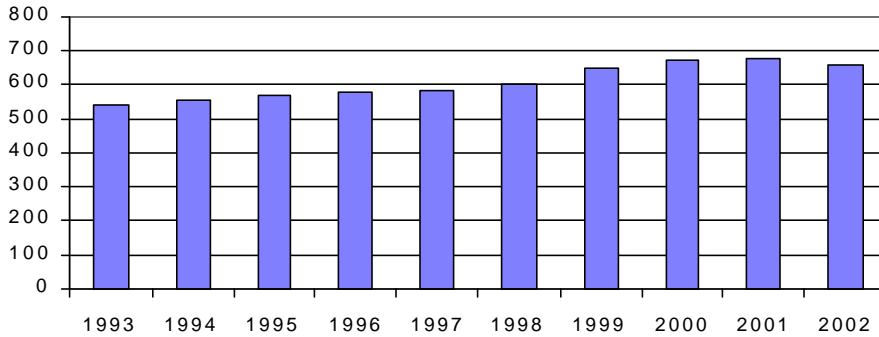

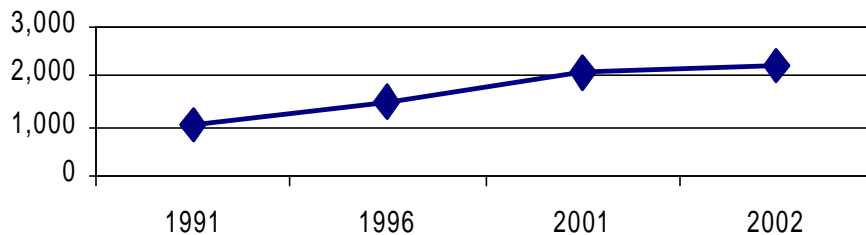

**Capacity of Adult Day Care \***



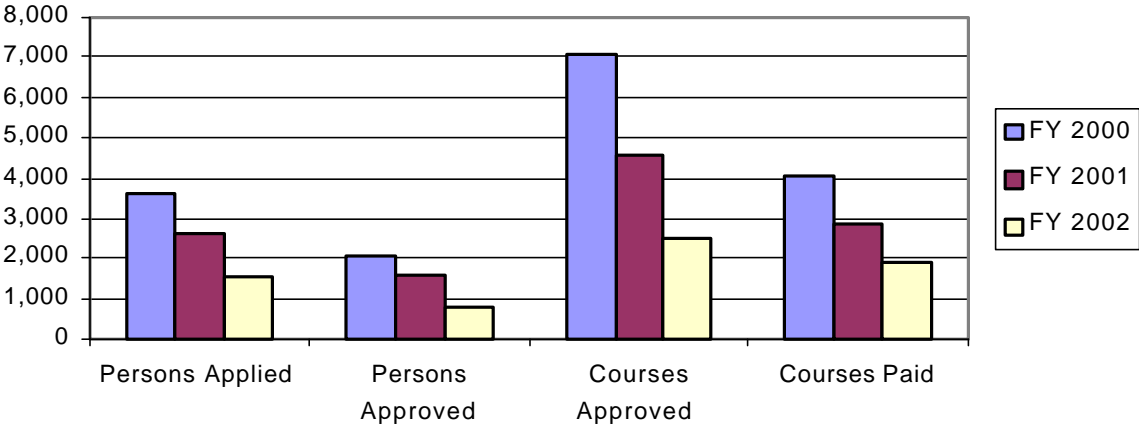

Child Care Provider Scholarships



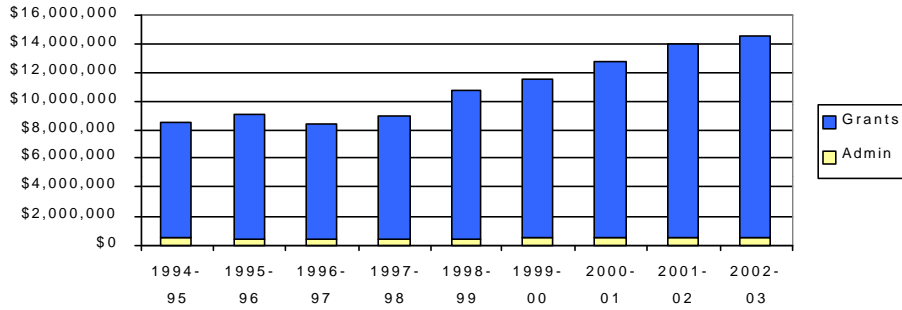

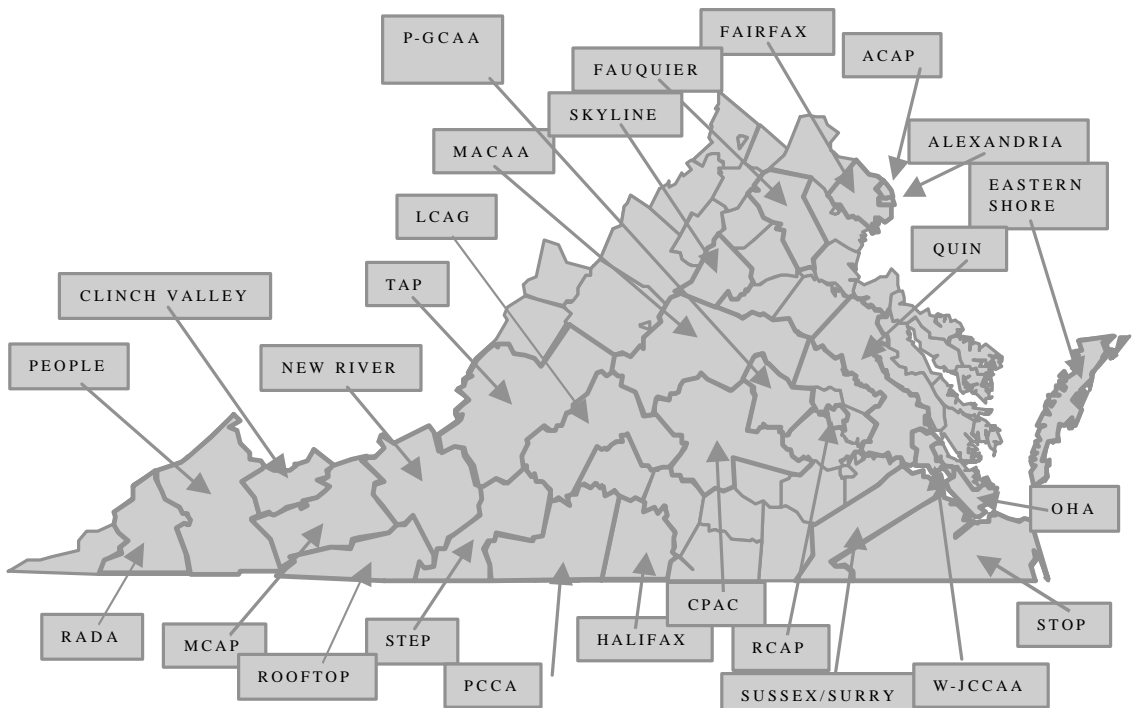

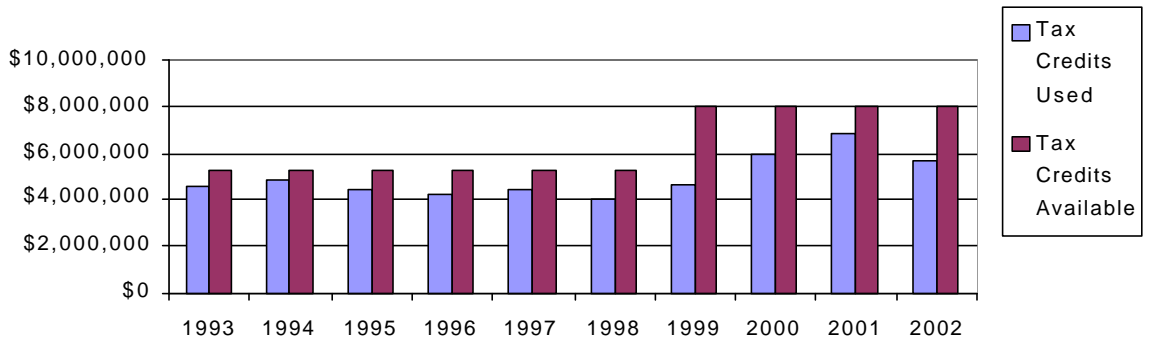

### NAP Tax Credits Available vs. Credits Used



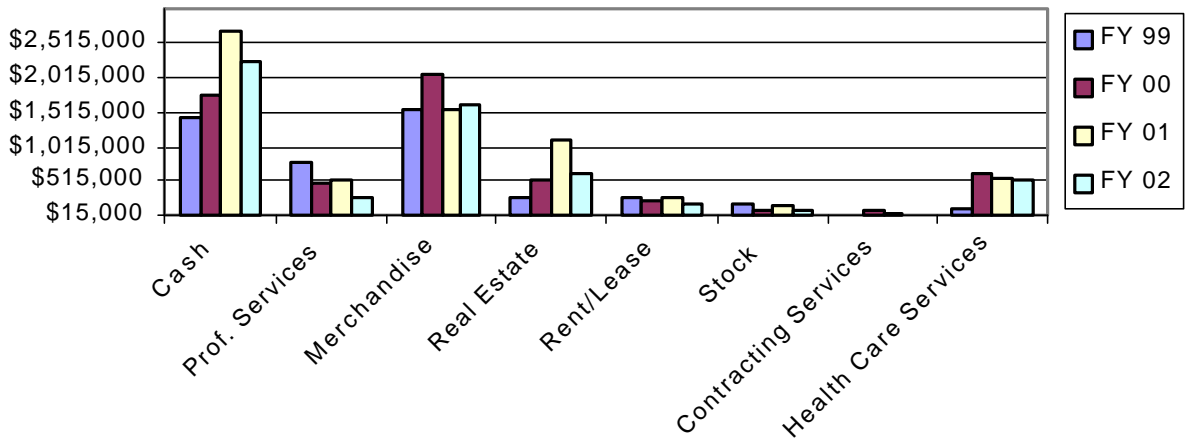

# Community Services

## Office of Volunteerism



From a 1998 fax survey conducted by VOV. About 300 surveys sent to VOV customers statewide, about 130 returned, 72 of which were from public and private nonprofit human service (HS) organizations.

Organizations were asked the number of volunteers they mobilize and the number of clients volunteers serve on average per year.

During FY 2002, VOV provided two technical assistance newsletters to 1400 leaders of volunteers, 2000 publications on how to develop and manage volunteer resources, training to 800 professional volunteer administrators, and three electronic mail updates to 700 constituents.

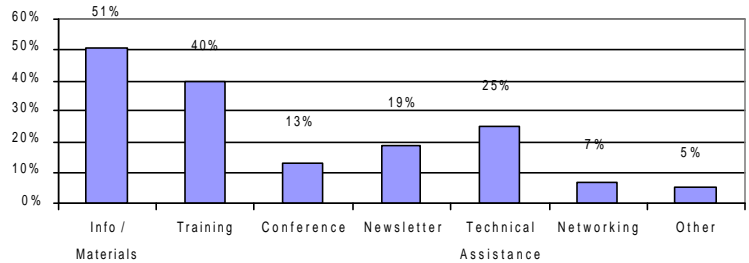

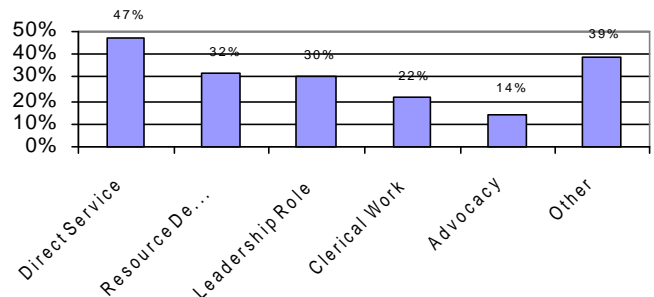

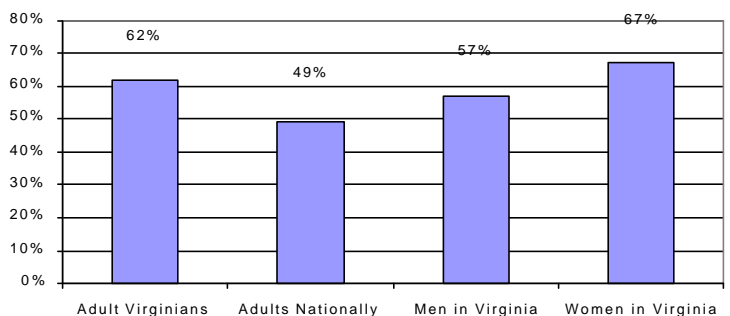

Virginia's Volunteer Activities



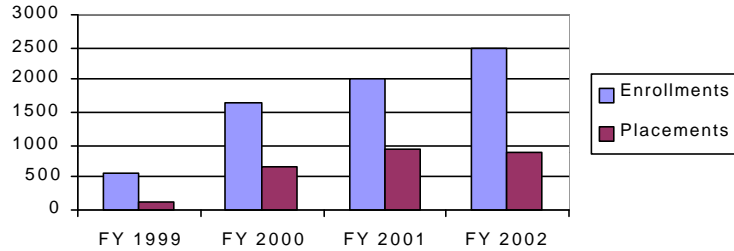

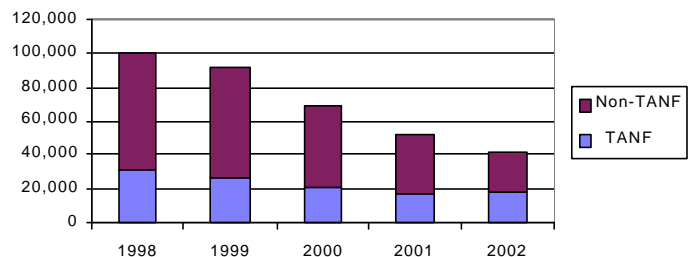

Dollar Obligations from Child Support Enforcement Orders

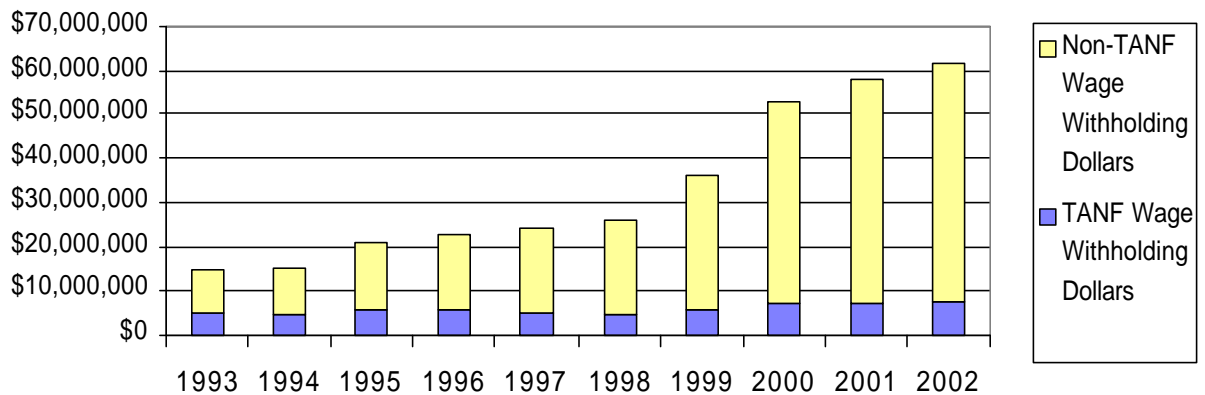

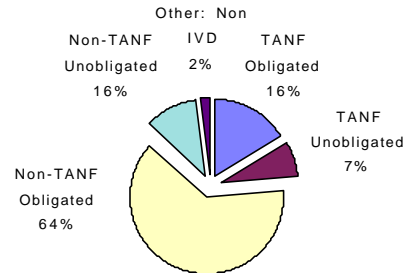

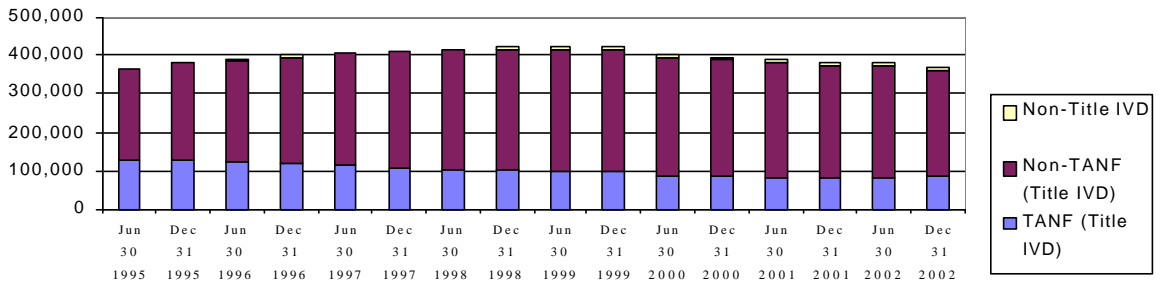

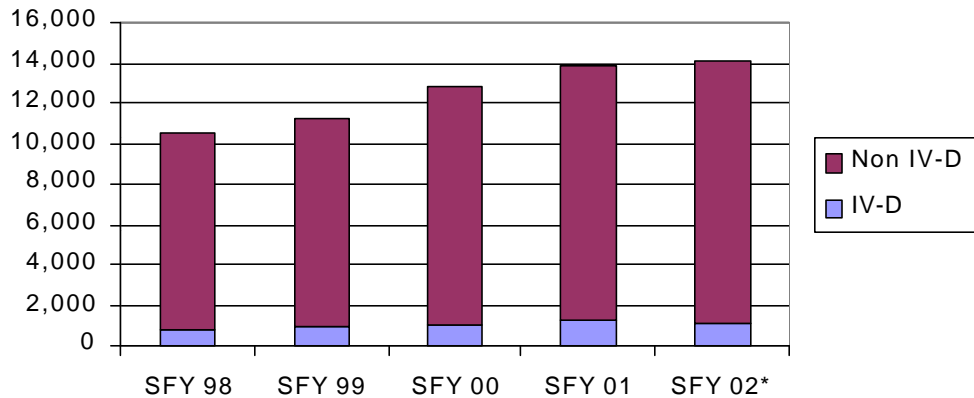

Hospital Paternities Established by State Fiscal Year



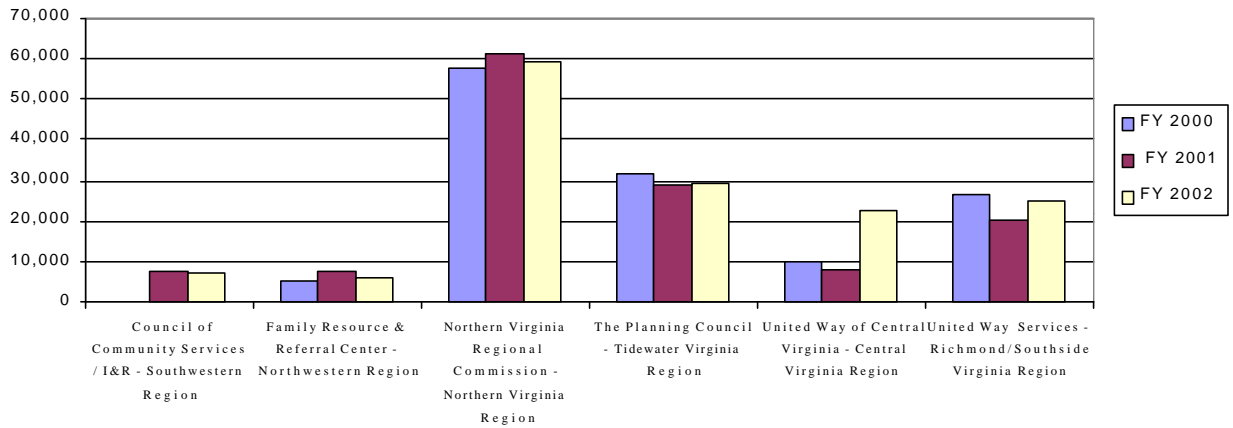

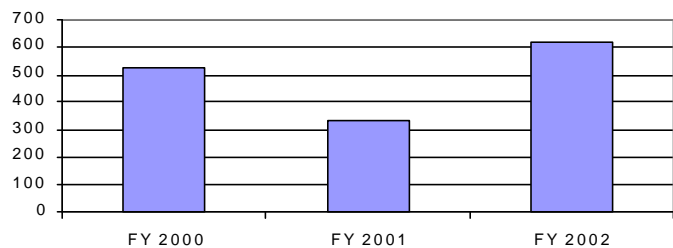

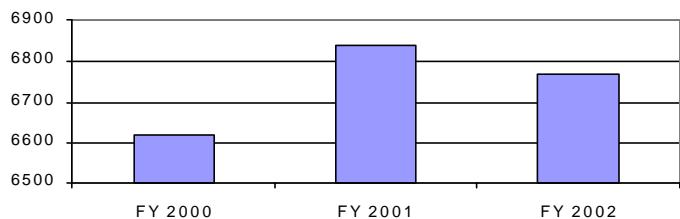

**Total Capacity Licensed Children's Residential Facilities**

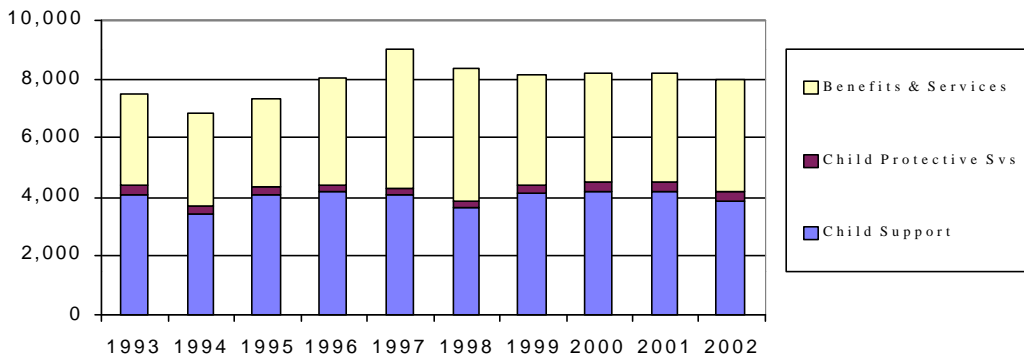

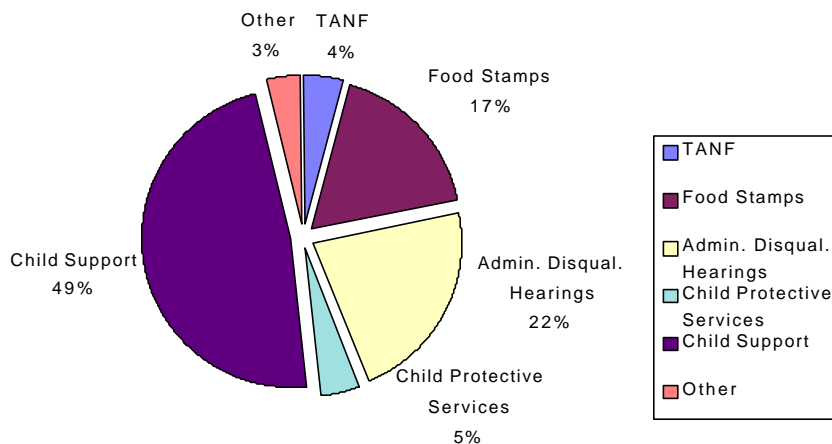

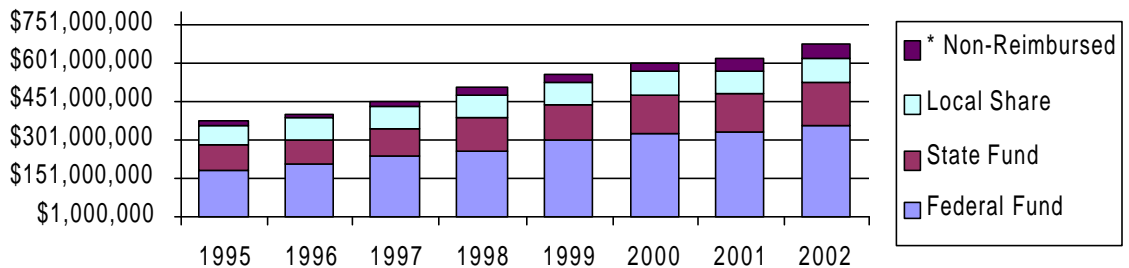
